We were pleased to welcome more than 120 people over the two days - both faces we'd seen before and some new ones too.

What remains very clear (as you will see on the post-it notes below) is there is a real diversity of opinion. We know a lot of you are waiting for more details on the project - we understand that and are not here to make you 'pick a position'.

We are pleased with how the various streams of work are progressing. The addition of Rhys Boswell to the project team (read more below) will add further momentum.

As we talked about at the open days, we are on track to have an update on runway alignment during June/July. That will enable us to then provide more detail on flight paths.

Before then, we will have a project website live so that you have a source of accurate information you can rely on and answers to frequently asked questions.



The active engagement with the Tarras community will continue throughout the project. We will also be broadening our discussions with communities around the wider Central Otago district and neighbouring regions.

We know it's a busy time of year so have packaged up all of the information we presented at the drop-in days so you can read it **here.**


The focus of the days was sharing the feedback we'd had from conversations with people who live in and around Tarras, explaining more about the rationale for it and our next steps.

It's the culmination of this work that led to Christchurch Airport being the first airport in the world **to be recognised for best practice in carbon reduction**. This is an achievement Rhys is justifiably proud of.
